The Janet Rosenwald Becker Award for Housing Advocacy NOMINATION FORM

The <u>Janet Rosenwald Becker Award for Housing Advocacy</u> was created by the Empower Missouri State Board in 2017 to honor Mrs. Becker's decades of work for access to affordable, accessible and decent housing for all. Janet began volunteering with Freedom of Residence, a fair housing group, shortly after moving to St. Louis. She co-founded Ecumenical Housing Production Corporation in 1979 - now called Beyond Housing. In 1987, she helped establish Adequate Housing for Missourians (AHM) which helped those with low-incomes pay the security deposits that often were barriers to securing an apartment. She worked on a committee drafting federal legislation to create a nationwide housing trust fund with the National Low Income Housing Coalition where she served on the board and executive committee. As a leader of Missouri Association for Social Welfare (MASW) as Empower Missouri was known from 1933-2014, Janet was central to the effort in 1994 to win a Missouri Housing Trust Fund by collecting a fee on documents filed with the Recorder of Deeds when purchasing a home.

This award will be given periodically to a person or organization in Missouri who/that has contributed to access to stable housing for people with extremely low incomes through persistent advocacy, innovative ideas, and collaboration with persons living in poverty. Special consideration will be given to nominees who have removed barriers to securing housing and/or who have secured public policy that improves access to affordable housing.
